## **Operations**

The Commission, led by six registered flax producers elected by the membership, continued to develop, coordinate and execute activities to meet its mission and mandate.

Directors for the fiscal year 2006/07 included Allen Kuhlmann (Chair), Lyle Simonson (Vice-Chair), Gregor Beck, Gordon Cresswell, Chris Hale and David Sefton.

Day-to-day management of the Commission was provided by the team of Executive Director, Linda Braun and administrative support, Janice Henriksen.

Auxiliary Services were provided by Levy Central (check-off collection). Fiber industry development was handled cooperatively with Crop Fibers Canada, Alvin Ulrich and Biolin Research Incorporated. Other additional expertise was contracted as required.

As per our regulatory requirements, regulations, board orders and policies were reviewed and amended by the Commission. They were acknowledged by the Agri-Food Council. These amendments more accurately reflect the governance structure needs of the Commission and the roles and responsibilities of its directors.

The management team continued to maintain and update the membership database. Levy rebates were prepared and payments issued to those producers requesting rebates for Periods 1 and 2.

## Research

Within the research pillar, the Commission continued to directly support two projects — that of Dr. Rowland's breeding project of fiber enhanced oilseed flax and Eric Johnson's weed control in flax.

From the national perspective, as an integral partner in Flax Canada 2015 with funding from the APF (Ag Policy Framework), we continued to support research projects in human and animal health and nutrition; and fiber related work.

Within the province, we shared information with Saskatchewan's agriculture department as well as Western Grains Research Foundation related to flax industry development to assist with their research direction for flax.

The Commission was actively engaged in a natural fibers network (with 22 plus organizations) where the network prepared and submitted a \$20 M research proposal under the Agricultural Bioproducts Innovation Program (ABIP). Funding announcement anticipated in late 2007 early 2008.

## **Communications**

Saskatchewan's registered flax producers were kept apprised of the Commission's priorities, initiatives and industry concerns via the annual general meeting, newsletters (2 editions) and personal contact via Directors and Executive Director. The Commission's web site (www.saskflax.com) underwent a complete make over — new look, new information, and more user-friendly operation. Web site reconstruction was completed with financial assistance from Advancing Canadian Agriculture and Agri-Food Saskatchewan (ACAAFS) Program.

To keep abreast of, and help direct the flax industry for producer benefit, the Commission participated in various industry associations and organizations such as Saskatchewan Council for Community Development, Canada Grains Council, Western Grains Research Foundation, Ag-West Bio, and Saskatchewan Trade and Export Partnership. Forums/workshops that Directors and/or Executive Director attended included the Canadian Nutrition Congress; AAFC sponsored Fiber Foresighting Sessions; WTO (Saskatchewan Updates), Animal Health Workshop, and Plant Bio-Industrial Oils Workshop.

## **Market Facilitation**

Food/fiber market areas continued to be priority areas for the Commission. From a food perspective, international activities included



collaborative efforts with AmeriFlax at International Association of Culinary Professionals and Institute of Food Technologists (trade show, information dissemination, flax food sampling program, DipStix Promotion). With Flax Canada 2015 we provided recipes and food photography for the U.S. flax promotions and healthy flax website. In addition, Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission partnered with Flax Canada 2015 to have a flax symposium at World Nutra.

Supply Side West Showcase provided insight into trends/production and companies involved in the natural products marketplace.

Domestically, the Commission networked at Cuisine Canada's conference and continued to disseminate nutritional and food product information to food and health professionals and Canadian consumers.

Within the fiber arena, the Commission completed Opportunities Envelope/Flax Straw Utilization Pilot Plant Project which involved building and testing a decortication equipment line to process straw and fiber; producing fiber for potential replacement of fiberglass; and initiating the development of a characterization and grading system to enable effective valuation and blending of commercial size lots for the marketplace.

In conjunction with the Agriculture Environmental Group Plan, the Commission continued its work with producers and industry regarding the development of an agricultural group plan for effective straw management. This involved demonstration work with clusters of flax producers and information dissemination. An effective straw management workshop is planned for February 2008 to complete this segment of the project.

As natural fibers gained importance across the nation, SaskFlax was represented on the National Biofibres Advisory Board and Flax Canada 2015. As well, SaskFlax led several fiber projects with Crop Fibers Canada and Sanelink via Flax Canada 2015 funding, determining potential for oilseed flax fiber.

As part of the Natural Fibers for the Green Economy Network (a national network of 22 plus organizations) SaskFlax worked on the submission of a funding proposal to the Agricultural Bioproducts Innovation Program. Successful program submissions to be announced in the next fiscal year.

Crop Fibers Canada, the pilot plant and resource center for flax fiber, moved forward with construction and modification of the decortication line and research efforts related to product characterization and grading with producers, researchers and the industry with the assistance of Alvin Ulrich and Biolin Research Incorporated.

SaskFlax and Crop Fibers Canada represented the interests of Saskatchewan at various North American events gathering market intelligence and potential customers in the fields of filtration, nonwovens and geotextiles.

### **AUDITOR'S REPORT**

## To the Members of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission

I have audited Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control as of July 31, 2007 to express an opinion as to the effectiveness of its control related to the following objectives.

- To safeguard Commission resources. That is, to ensure its assets are not lost or used inappropriately; to ensure it does not inappropriately incur obligations; to establish a financial plan for the purposes of achieving its financial goals; and to monitor and react to its progress towards the objectives established in its financial plan.
- To prepare reliable financial reports.
- To conduct its activities following laws, regulations and policies related to financial reporting, safeguarding Commission resources, revenue-raising, spending, borrowing and investing.

I used the control framework developed by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) to make my judgements about the effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control. I did not audit certain aspects of control concerning the effectiveness, economy, and efficiency of certain management decision-making processes.

The CICA defines control as comprising those elements of an organization that, taken together, support people in the achievement of the organization's objectives. Control is effective to the extent that it provides reasonable assurance that the organization will achieve its objectives.

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's management is responsible for effective control related to the objectives described above. My responsibility is to express an opinion on the effectiveness of control based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with standards for assurance engagements established by the CICA. Those standards require that I plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance as to effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control related to the objectives above. An audit includes obtaining an understanding of the significant risks related to these objectives, the key control elements and control activities to manage these risks and examining, on a test basis, evidence relating to control.

In my opinion, Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control was effective, in all material respects, related to the objectives stated above as of July 31, 2007 based on the CICA criteria of control framework.

Control can provide only reasonable, not absolute, assurance of achieving objectives reliably for two reasons. First, there are inherent limitations in control including judgement in decision-making, human error, collusion to circumvent control activities and management overriding control. Second, cost/benefit decisions are made when designing control in organizations. Because control can be expected to provide only reasonable assurance, not absolute assurance, the objectives referred to above may not be achieved reliably. Also, projections of any evaluation of control to future periods are subject to the risk that control amy become ineffective because of changes in internal and external conditions, or the degree of compliance with control activities may deteriorate.





## Accounting policies

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission operates to promote and enhance flax production in Saskatchewan for maximum return to producers through market development, research, leadership and communication in the industry.

The carrying amount of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and research grants payable approximates their fair market market value due to the short-term maturities of these items.

The commission does not have a significant credit exposure to any individual customer or counterpart.

Revenues are recognized when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated.

Amortization of capital assets is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the capital assets.

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

The budgeted figures are presented for comparison purposes as prepared and approved by the Board, reclassified to conform to the current financial statement presentation. They have not been audited or reviewed.


