SaskFlax, directed by the Board of Directors (registered flax producers of Saskatchewan) continued to develop, coordinate and execute activities geared to meeting the Commission's mission and mandate.

Directors for the fiscal year 2007/08 included Allen Kuhlmann (Chair), Lyle Simonson (Vice Chair), Chris Hale and Gregor Beck. Bill Rusk was appointed for a one year term to replace retiring Director Gordon Cresswell. David Sefton continued his role as director as per the Commission's regulations.

Day-to-day management of the Commission was provided by Food Focus Saskatoon, Inc. with Linda Braun as Executive Director and Janice Henriksen providing administrative support.

Levy Central supplied check-off collection services while fiber industry development services were handled cooperatively with Crop Fibers Canada, Alvin Ulrich and Biolin Research Incorporated. Eaton & Associates handled our international conference coordination, web site maintenance and other additional expertise as required.

To meet the annual requirements of the Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission Regulations, the Commission reviewed its regulations, board orders and policies. They amended terms of office (3-3) year terms from 3-2 year terms) and reviewed staggered director terms (return to two director positions open annually) to more accurately reflect the governance structure needs of the Commission and the roles and responsibilities of directors. These amendments were subsequently reviewed and approved by the Agri-Food Council.

The management team continued to maintain and update the membership database. Levy rebates were prepared and payment issues to those producers requesting rebates for Periods 1 and 2.

An intensive strategic planning session began with individual director examination of key questions followed by a facilitated workshop experience which provided confirmation and affirmation of Commission goals and objectives. The document provides a blueprint for continued action in our priority areas.

Research

Within the research pillar, SaskFlax saw the completion of Dr. Rowland's flax/fiber breeding and Eric Johnson's flax/weed control projects. The Commission approved two projects: Winter Nursery with Dr. Rowland (CDC) to assist in shortened breeding time frames and Low Cost Equipment Modification for Straw Management to enhance straw values and fiber extraction.

From the national perspective, our support for research in human nutrition, animal health and industrial uses including fiber continued with our partner Flax Canada 2015 within the Ag Policy Framework funding. The Breeding Strategy drafted by Flax Canada 2015 was reviewed by Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission with specific activities selected for fiscal year 2008/09. Under the auspices of the AgBioproducts Innovation Program (ABIP), SaskFlax continued to support the natural fibers network and worked diligently to have the contribution agreement signed.

Within Saskatchewan, the Commission continued to collaborate with the Ag Development Program of the Ministry of Agriculture and Western Grains Research Foundation providing direction and encouragement related to research projects undertaken and/or supported by these respective agencies.

Communications

Saskatchewan's registered flax producers were kept apprised of the Commission priorities, activities and industry concerns via the annual general meeting, the recently revamped web site, newsletters, interviews/articles with popular press and personal contact with directors and management.

To keep abreast of and help direct the flax industry for producer benefit, directors

participated in various industry associations, organizations and committees such as the Flax Council of Canada, Agricultural Council



of Saskatchewan, AgWest Bio, Saskatchewan Trade and Export Partnership, Western Grains Research Foundation and the National Forum on Seed.

As firm believers of agriculture and its importance to Saskatchewan, the Commission supported such programs as the Saskatchewan Outstanding Young Farmers, Saskatchewan 4-H Foundation, Agriculture in the Classroom and the flax class at Agribition's grain show. On the national level, SaskFlax directors and/or

executive director represented the interests of its members at various fiber planning sessions, climate change meetings and within the Genome Prairie organization (Steering and Communication Committees). We continued our liaison with our U.S. counterpart, AmeriFlax and attended the Flax Institute research update.

Market Facilitation

Food/fiber arenas continued to be profiled by the Commission. Within the food arena, SaskFlax entered an agreement to publish a flax cookbook with Canadian publisher Whitecap Books. The Executive Director worked closely with Whitecap to develop the manuscript, format recipes and provide photography. The book has an anticipated release of March 2009.

Joint promotions planned with the Flax Council of Canada/AmeriFlax for IFT were cancelled. AmeriFlax Productions Manager Kaye Effertz left her position and the organization contracted Sherri Coleman to handle flax promotions.

Consumer provided information and recipes continued to be disseminated upon request.

Within the fiber arena, the Commission completed its agricultural group plan for effective straw management by hosting an Effective Straw Management Workshop for Saskatchewan farmers and allied industries. With participation from researchers, processors, farmers and government crop, bioproduct and industry specialists, we wrote and disseminated 12,000 plus resource booklets related to Beneficial Management Practices for effective straw management.

"Fiber Foundations — Transportation,
Clothing and Shelter in the Bioeconomy"
International Conference on Flax and Other
Bast Plants (July 21 to 23, Saskatoon) attracted
133 delegates from 18 countries. This FAO/
ESCORNEA conference, a partnership with
the Institute of Natural Fibres Poland held in
North America for the first time proved to be
a successful venture in terms of networking,
sharing of information and recognition of
Saskatchewan's expertise and potential for fiber
industry development. It also strengthened the
Canadian ag-bio fibers community from both
research and commercialization perspectives.

Crop Fibers Canada, the pilot plant and resource centre for flax fiber continued to modify its equipment line, participate in national research efforts, work with farmers to effectively manage the straw and work on the development of standards for the industry.

The NAFGEN (Natural Ag Fibers for the Green Economy Network) project under the Agricultural Bioproducts Innovation Program made very little progress towards agreement signing with the federal government. This program has seven platforms that are to complete research priorities from breeding, post harvest and primary processing to commercialization and product development to the study of sustainability.

SaskFlax and Crop Fibers Canada continued to represent the interests of Saskatchewan flax producers at various workshops, conferences and meetings related to fiber and fiber products. We continued to liaise with interested individuals and organizations and respond to their averies.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission

I have audited Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control as of July 31, 2008 to express an opinion as to the effectiveness of its control related to the following objectives.

- To safeguard Commission resources. That is, to ensure its assets are not lost or used inappropriately; to ensure it does not inappropriately incur obligations; to establish a financial plan for the purposes of achieving its financial goals; and to monitor and react to its progress towards the objectives established in its financial plan.
- To prepare reliable financial reports.
- To conduct its activities following laws, regulations and policies related to financial reporting, safeguarding Commission resources, revenue-raising, spending, borrowing and investing.

I used the control framework developed by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) to make my judgements about the effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control. I did not audit certain aspects of control concerning the effectiveness, economy, and efficiency of certain management decision-making processes.

The CICA defines control as comprising those elements of an organization that, taken together, support people in the achievement of the organization's objectives. Control is effective to the extent that it provides reasonable assurance that the organization will achieve its objectives.

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's management is responsible for effective control related to the objectives described above. My responsibility is to express an opinion on the effectiveness of control based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with standards for assurance engagements established by the CICA. Those standards require that I plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance as to effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control related to the objectives above. An audit includes obtaining an understanding of the significant risks related to these objectives, the key control elements and control activities to manage these risks and examining, on a test basis, evidence relating to control.

In my opinion, Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control was effective, in all material respects, related to the objectives stated above as of July 31, 2008 based on the CICA criteria of control framework.

Control can provide only reasonable, not absolute, assurance of achieving objectives reliably for two reasons. First, there are inherent limitations in control including judgement in decision-making, human error, collusion to circumvent control activities and management overriding control. Second, cost/benefit decisions are made when designing control in organizations. Because control can be expected to provide only reasonable assurance, not absolute assurance, the objectives referred to above may not be achieved reliably. Also, projections of any evaluation of control to future periods are subject to the risk that control may become ineffective because of changes in internal and external conditions, or the degree of compliance with control activities may deteriorate.



Accounting policies

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission operates to promote and enhance flax production in Saskatchewan for maximum return to producers through market development, research, leadership and communication in the industry. The carrying amount of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and research grants payable approximates their fair market market value due to the short-term maturities of these items. The commission does not have a significant credit exposure to any individual customer or counterpart. Revenues are recognized when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated. Amortization of capital assets is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the capital assets. The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

The budgeted figures are presented for comparison purposes as prepared and approved by the Board, reclassified to conform to the current financial statement presentation. They have not been audited or reviewed.


