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Operations

In its 13th year of operation, strong leadership continued to guide the organization. Directors included Allen Kuhlmann (Chair), Lyle Simonson (Vice-Chair); Gregor Beck and Chris Hale. David Sefton's term was renewed and the Commission welcomed Erwin Hanley who replaced retiring Director Bill Rusk.

The Commission broadened its advisory capacity by welcoming Venkata Vakulabharanam (Oilseeds Specialist) and Glenn Payne (BioProducts Specialist). They joined Dr. Rowland in keeping the Board apprised of industry and government happenings.

Day to day management services were contracted with the firm of Food Focus Saskatoon, Inc., Linda Braun (Executive Director) and Janice Henriksen (Administration). Penny Eaton, Eaton & Associates Consultants assisted with much of the communication programs. Alvin Ulrich and his firm, Biolin Research provided expertise and executed activities under the fiber pillar.

Levy Central supplied check-off collection services. Clients of Levy Central worked together to create a new agency as the Saskatchewan Canola Development Commission notified all clients that they would no longer provide this service after January 2010. The coalition consisted of canola, flax, mustard, canaryseed, winter cereals and oats commodity groups. Western Grains Research Foundation participated as a potential future client.

The management team continued to maintain and update the membership base. Levy rebates were prepared and payment issued to producers requesting payment for Periods 1 and 2.

Regulations, board orders and policies were reviewed in accordance with the Agri-Food Council requirements. Our auditor was advised of new financial reporting rules initiated this year by the Council.

Research

Within the research pillar, Dr. Rowland's winter nursery project and Biolin's equipment modification for straw management continued. Projects approved included the CDC RILS effort in conjunction with Saskatchewan ADF program. On the national level, SaskFlax partnered with the Flax Council of Canada, Genome Prairie and others on the TUFGEN (Total Utilization of Flax Genomics). TUFGEN aims at providing genetic knowledge for improvement of seed and fiber traits of oilseed flax to enhance its usefulness, benefits and versatility by developing a strong genomics base for breeding and improvement.

SaskFlax also lent its vocal support to the Flax Council of Canada's efforts to investigate solutions for non transgenic herbicide tolerance flax.

Viterra, the Alberta Research Council and SaskFlax agreed to collaborate on a breeding project to adapt flax varieties for the northern grain belt. Project objectives include development of northern flax varieties that feature early maturing and day length sensitivity, tolerance to seeding into cold soils, determinate maturity and the ability to dry down rapidly.

As the entire Canadian flax industry will benefit from varieties developed, SaskFlax worked with its partners to procure required funding from both industry and governments (provincial and national). Funding applications were submitted to CAAP (Canadian Agricultural Adaptation Program), ADF (Ag Development Fund — Saskatchewan); and WGRF (Western Grains Research Foundation). The coalition continues to move the initiative forward.

We were very pleased to be invited to the Crop Development Centre's flax breeder selection process where we learned about candidates experience and their goals for flax. We look forward to working with the successful candidate, Dr. Helen Booker in the coming years.



Under the auspices of the Ag BioProduct Innovation Program (ABIP), SaskFlax continued to support the Natural Fibers Network from Pillar 1 with Breeding and Agronomy; Platform 2 Field Treatment (retting) and Harvest Technologies (stripper header/straight combining) and Primary Processing (extraction of fiber/shive) to Platform 7 Sustainability.

The Sustainability exercise led by Maria Wellisch and SaskFlax Directors proved to be a very positive pilot project for not only the flax industry, but for the broader topic area of sustainability. SaskFlax has been a leader for Platform 7 and has been widely recognized for its commitment, cooperation and positive attitudes towards a sustainable industry. The project provided for the development of a vision statement and the template for the implementation of an action plan for value adding from both a seed and a straw perspective as well as initiating dialogue between/among primary producers, processors, and key value-added stakeholders along the chain.

Communications

Saskatchewan's registered flax producers were kept apprised of Commission priorities, activities and industry concerns via our annual meeting, web site, newsletters, interviews/articles with popular press and personal contact with directors and management.

Memberships and/or representation with allied industry organizations and events like Flax Canada 2015, AgWest, STEP, WGRF, National Forum on Seed, etc. kept producers abreast of industry happenings. As firm believers in tomorrow, SaskFlax continued

to support organizations and programs like Saskatchewan 4-H and Outstanding Young Farmers to further ensure industry sustainability.

Your check-off dollars were leveraged with Advancing Canadian Agriculture and Agri-Food (ACAAF) dollars to executive "Just the Flax". This pilot program authored by Larry Weber, provided reports on markets, production, supply and demand, growing conditions, etc. to help producers make informed and timely decisions for cropping and marketing.

Market Facilitation

Food/fiber arenas continued to be profiled by SaskFlax. Within the food arenas, SaskFlax via Whitecap Books released "Everything Flax" one of the first ever Canadian flax cookbooks.

At home, the Commission showcased flax and its role in a healthy lifestyle at Saskatchewan indemand trade show and through resource material dissemination.

SaskFlax consultants attended such events as Supply Side West to gain insight and understanding of flax's opportunity in North American's functional foods and supplements market. Information gleaned was shared with our producers and value-added companies.

Within the fiber arena, Crop Fibers Canada, the pilot plant and resource centre for flax fiber continued to modify its equipment line, participate in national efforts and work with ASTM (American Society for Testing Materials) on Standards Development. These activities were geared to grow the fiber industry. Dialogue continued with producers, processors, individuals and companies interested in specific technologies and opportunities to invest/grow the industry.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission

I have audited Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control as of July 31, 2009 to express an opinion as to the effectiveness of its control related to the following objectives.

- To safeguard Commission resources. That is, to ensure its assets are not lost or used inappropriately; to ensure it does not inappropriately incur obligations; to establish a financial plan for the purposes of achieving its financial goals; and to monitor and react to its progress towards the objectives established in its financial plan.
- To prepare reliable financial reports.
- To conduct its activities following laws, regulations and policies related to financial reporting, safeguarding Commission resources, revenue-raising, spending, borrowing and investing.

I used the control framework developed by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) to make my judgements about the effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control. I did not audit certain aspects of control concerning the effectiveness, economy, and efficiency of certain management decision-making processes.

The CICA defines control as comprising those elements of an organization that, taken together, support people in the achievement of the organization's objectives. Control is effective to the extent that it provides reasonable assurance that the organization will achieve its objectives.

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's management is responsible for effective control related to the objectives described above. My responsibility is to express an opinion on the effectiveness of control based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with standards for assurance engagements established by the CICA. Those standards require that I plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance as to effectiveness of Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control related to the objectives above. An audit includes obtaining an understanding of the significant risks related to these objectives, the key control elements and control activities to manage these risks and examining, on a test basis, evidence relating to control.

In my opinion, Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission's control was effective, in all material respects, related to the objectives stated above as of July 31, 2009 based on the CICA criteria of control framework.

Control can provide only reasonable, not absolute, assurance of achieving objectives reliably for two reasons. First, there are inherent limitations in control including judgement in decision-making, human error, collusion to circumvent control activities and management overriding control. Second, cost/benefit decisions are made when designing control in organizations. Because control can be expected to provide only reasonable assurance, not absolute assurance, the objectives referred to above may not be achieved reliably. Also, projections of any evaluation of control to future periods are subject to the risk that control may become ineffective because of changes in internal and external conditions, or the degree of compliance with control activities may deteriorate.

1. Accounting policies

Saskatchewan Flax Development Commission operates to promote and enhance flax production in Saskatchewan for maximum return to producers through market development, research, leadership and communication in the industry. The carrying amount of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and research grants payable approximates their fair market market value due to the short-term maturities of these items. The commission does not have a significant credit exposure to any individual customer or counterpart. Revenues are recognized when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated. Amortization of capital assets is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the capital assets. The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant. The budgeted figures are presented for comparison purposes as prepared and approved by the Board, reclassified to conform to the current financial statement presentation. They have not been audited or reviewed.
